O processo de cura é realizado numa reincidência no amor, se no termo 'amor' combinamos todos os diversos componentes do instinto sexual; tal reincidência é indispensável, pois os sintomas que provocaram a procura de um tratamento nada mais são do que precipitados de conflitos anteriores relacionados com a repressão ou com o retorno do reprimido, e só podem ser eliminados por uma nova ascensão das mesmas paixões. Fecha o livro o posfácio do sociólogo Richard Miskolci, que contextualiza amplamente o História da sexualidade, de Foucault, e apresenta novos caminhos para a discussão da teoria queer e dos sujeitos desejantes.

Foi escrito por psicanalistas que se indagam sobre os avanços em seu tempo e mostram como as primeiras teorizações freudianas sobre as neuroses atuais podem ser renovadas para auxiliar na compreensão do mal-estar contemporâneo. Os temas abordados aqui tratam daquilo que resiste à simbolização. Sua leitura, portanto, nos lança no campo das marcas que reaparecem como corpos estranhos e dos excessos que transbordam, seja pela impossibilidade da tramitação psíquica ou pela ausência da via representacional. É o campo da invasão pulsional do eu e da descarga em ato, decorrentes do fracasso do recalque primário e da irrupção da energia não ligada. É o campo, em suma, dos limites do psiquismo. Os autores escrevem sobre o sofrimento dos sujeitos na atualidade e as formas de adoecimento que lhe são correlatas. Já não se trata apenas das neuroses históricas – como as denominou Freud –, mas das patologias de borda, cuja frequência aumentou vertiginosamente nas últimas décadas.
