The modern Iranian public sphere, Dabashi argues, cannot be understood apart from this dynamic interaction. *Persophilia* takes into its purview works as varied as Xenophon's *Cyropaedia* and Nietzsche's *Thus Spoke Zarathustra*, Handel's *Xerxes* and Puccini's *Turandot*, and Gauguin and Matisse's fascination with Persian art. The result is a provocative reading of world history that dismantles normative historiography and alters our understanding of postcolonial nations.
